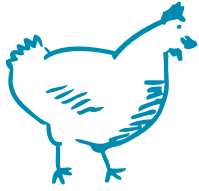
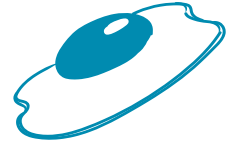


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# Eggy Math



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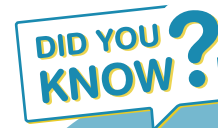
Let's do some eggy math! Complete the questions below. P.S. Don't forget your calculator!

2. What is the total number of eggs produced each year?

3. How many dozen eggs do we produce in Canada each year?  
(Round to the nearest million)

4. Canada's population is close to 37.8 million people. If all the eggs produced were divided evenly among all Canadians, how many eggs would each Canadian get each year? (Round down to the nearest egg)



In Canada, there are about 25,000,000 laying hens (female chickens). Each hen, on average, produces 350 eggs per year.
